


# THURSDAY JULY 13, 2023 ILLUMINATED MANUSCRIPTS

Before the invention of the printing press, knowledge was passed on through oral tradition or through the painstaking process of hand transcribing books and manuscripts. Often, hand-written manuscripts had decorative lettering and images to support the text. Making such images and fancy lettering became an art, almost a calling or vocation. Because many of these images and letters often had gold or other precious metal highlights that glittered or reflected light, they were call Illuminations, and the manuscripts that illuminations contained Illuminated were called Manuscripts. From fairy tales to Bibles learn the fascinating history of Illuminated Manuscripts.


## WEDNESDAY JULY 19, 2023 LATIN IS BEAUTIFUL




# THURSDAY JULY 20, 2023 GRADUATION CEREMONY
